Pastors can be skeptics too.

I feel I need to admit to you a skepticism I felt earlier in the year and share with you how I have seen that thing I was unsure about develop into a wonderful thing.

Weekly, on Tuesday afternoons, I meet with other pastors in town for a text study. In these meetings, we talk 50% about the scripture readings we will use in worship in the upcoming weekend and 50% about ministry-resources, happenings in our congregations, how we can work together to do God's work. It was at this test study I first heard of *A Sanctified Art*. Both Atonement and Good Shepherd have used resources from that group in past years.

This is where the skepticism comes in. My initial thoughts about *A Sanctified Art* were negative; "that approach to worship sounds weird! At Peace, we have a good rotation of worship styles- I wouldn't want to mess with that. This may work for you all, but it wouldn't really work at Peace." Despite this skepticism, after hearing about this resource for over a year, I was finally willing to look it up. My first viewing of the website was not much more charitable than the thoughts I just shared, but I figured it might be worth trying. I reached out to the Worship committee and asked their thoughts and they gave me the green light to try the Lenten series, "Everything [in] Between."

After ordering the Lent series resource, I still felt skeptical. As I prepared orders of worship and put together the devotional booklet, I was unimpressed. I had envisioned a certain expectation for how the resources would lead us through Lent, and I wasn't getting what I thought I wanted.

Then Ash Wednesday came. We used the liturgy from A Sanctified Art. I preached a sermon that used the scriptural commentary from A Sanctified Art. People picked up the devotional booklets created by A Sanctified Art. And. It. Was. Awesome!

In the weeks since, I have gotten excellent feedback from you all telling me that you have enjoyed the devotional booklet, the social media posts, the prayers during worship, the sermons, and the theme of the series. I have also gotten suggestions for ways we might tweak the resources slightly to better fit with what we are accustomed to at Peace, but even that feedback has been overwhelmingly positive.

Whether or not my skepticism was warranted, your feedback has shown me that this is a good resource that Peace can add to its rotation of worship experiences. We won't use *A Sanctified Art* for every liturgical season going forward, but we will revisit it now and then going forward. We'll also look for other resources, growing in new ways to praise God in worship, fellowship, study, and outward facing ministries. We'll grow in new ways while staying rooted in Jesus' revelation of God's love through scripture and faith. We will trust that God can speak in many ways to us and through us, not just in the ways we are accustomed.

And we'll continue to let go of our skepticism together, understanding that new things may be uncomfortable at first, but have the potential to provide new perspective on this God we think we already know everything about. Thank you for hearing my confession of skepticism and for being willing to try new things with me and with each of the members of this family we call Peace .



## **Worship News**

## April 5 & 6 Everything [in] Between Righteousness & Mercy

The crowds grumble at Jesus' self-invitation to stay with Zacchaeus, and their righteous indignation isn't without cause. As a tax collector, Zacchaeus has extorted money and acted in collusion with the empire, using his position to oppress his own people. It is important to call out oppression, and yet, Jesus offers mercy. That mercy then begets more mercy as Zacchaeus, unprompted, offers to return what he took, and then some. *Luke 19:1-10* 

## April 12 & 13 (Palm Sunday) Everything [in] Between Shouting & Silence

Jesus doesn't instigate his own parade. Instead, just his quiet presence alone inspires the multitude to shout out and praise God. When the religious leaders try to silence the crowd, Jesus tells them that the noise level isn't the point—even the stones would cry out if they were silent. It takes wisdom to know when our voice is needed and when it's just noise. *Luke 19:29-40* 

## April 17 (Maundy Thursday) Everything [in] Between Power & Humility

In his final hours, Jesus redefines power through acts of humility, including sharing a final meal with his closest friends and those who will soon betray him. After breaking bread, the disciples argue about who is the greatest, but Jesus tells them that the greatest must be the least and the leader must be the servant, turning their hierarchy on its head. According to Jesus, humility is powerful, and real power is shown through humility.

Luke 22:1-27

## April 18 (Good Friday) Everything [in] Between Acceptance & Resistance

As Jesus dies on the cross, one thief resists him and the other accepts him as Messiah. Jesus resists the empire but accepts his fate. We also are called to resist systems of power and oppression, and yet we ultimately have to accept that Jesus dies—and one day we will too. We have to discern what to accept as given and what to resist, what is "God's will," and what is the result of our own unquestioned systems. *Luke* 23:32-49

## April 20 (Easter) Everything [in] Between Grief & Hope

Grief is a healthy response to Jesus' death and a valid way to enter worship on Easter morning. And yet, the women at the empty tomb are given hope amidst their mourning. The other disciples don't believe the women's message, but Peter, living in the in-between of grief and hope, runs to the tomb to see for himself. Grieving doesn't have to make us hopeless. Hope can compel us to take action when we are deep in grief. *Luke 24:1-12* 

## **April 26 & 27**

In spite of all we have heard and all we have seen, it is often hard to believe. Because it is hard to believe, we will invest ourselves in the Easter mystery for fifty days (a week of weeks). Because it is hard to believe, John the evangelist will provide sign after sign celebrating Jesus' victory over death. Because it is hard to believe, the risen Jesus will return to us again and again in the mystery of holy communion, inviting us to touch and taste his presence, and offering us his peace.



Ask the Spirit to guide their study and discussion of climate justice, the Nicene Creed, the role of the Holy Trinity in creation, and how Christians engage with the creation story.
- 5 Remember in prayer worship leaders and musicians participating in the ecumenical Music that Makes Community workshop in Waco, Texas, a day of building community through singing, learning and fellowship.
- 6 Pray for a spirit of humble generosity that recognizes and encourages the diverse gifts and contributions of our siblings in Christ, who give as they are able and are inspired by their gratitude towards and love for God.
- 7 Praise the Creator for the new life of an emerging spring, which inspires our joy, awe and hope.

- 8 There are about 390,000 people in foster care in our country, ranging from infants to young adults. Pray that these young people will experience love, understanding, security and encouragement in their foster families. Give thanks for foster parents and remember those young adults who, aging out of foster care, may face new uncertainties.
- 9 Seek God's forgiveness and mercy for the times when we have hurt, offended or demeaned others, intentionally or unintentionally. Pray for the Spirit to grant us humility, penitent hearts and a compassion that stirs us to make amends and heal broken relationships.
- 10 Lift up in prayer farmers, ranchers and agricultural workers. Give thanks for their efforts to feed the world and care for creation, and pray for abundant harvests.
- 11 Give thanks that God is always doing something new in and through us, wonderful things that impact others when they witness Christ's awesome love reflected in our lives as disciples.
- 12 Pray for youth in our congregations and communities, recognizing the challenges they face, celebrating the joys they experience and showing gratitude for what they add to our faith communities, which need the gifts of all generations to do God's work in the world.
- 13 Palm Sunday Pray that we might accompany Jesus in his journey of persecution, suffering, death and resurrection, a journey of love and sacrifice for our sake.
- 14 Pledge to bear hope, grace and newness in Christ to our neighbors in need, especially those who are poor, hungry, sick, imprisoned, unemployed or plagued by war or domestic conflict.
- 15 Praise God for the strength we draw from Scripture, from our siblings in Christ, from living in community and from the tireless work of the ever present Spirit.
- 16 Pray to the Lord for comfort, strength and renewed faith when you feel broken and worn-out



# PRAYER VENTURES April

17 Maunday Thursday Today we end our observation of Lent and shift our attention to what God has done for the world through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, son of God and son of humankind. Give thanks for the gift of new life in Christ, a life wrapped in God's boundless grace.

18 Good Friday "Start being brave about everything. Drive out darkness and spread light. Don't look at your weaknesses. Realize instead that in Christ crucified you can do everything" (Catherine of Siena, 1347-1380). Pray for the Spirit to strengthen our faith so that, through us, God's love and mercy might shine brightly in the world.

19 Ask the Spirit for a faith that is certain and resilient, even when we don't fully understand or appreciate what God has done for humanity through Jesus Christ.

20 Easter Day Sing praise and thanksgiving to God! This is the day the Lord has made for us to gather as loved and forgiven children, celebrating our freedom from the bondage of sin and death.

21 When you reflect on who might need your presence, comfort and reassuring words of love and hope, who comes to mind? Include them in your prayers and reach out to them.

22 Give thanks and pray for directors for evangelical mission, who serve in partnership with ELCA church-wide ministries and synods, helping them to found "new start" ministries, renew congregations, nurture stewardship, and identify, develop and equip leaders for ministry.

23 Every day, Jesus walks with us, sharing good news and wisdom just as he did with Cleopas and his companion on the road to Emmaus. Pray that the Spirit will help us express that good news and wisdom in our conversations with our neighbors.

24 "We are not fed by only doing one way of ministry. Instead it is about seeing the face of God in every person who walks through the door, about embracing the inherent dignity of every individual, regardless of their circumstances"

(the Rev. Esther K. Sianipar, "Serving With Shobi's Table: A Reflection," shobistable.org). Pray for our neighbors who suffer hunger, lack reliable access to nutritious food and yearn for the support of caring communities, and thank God for our congregational, synodical and churchwide ministries that serve them without bias or judgment

25 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Alaska Synod, Northern Texas-Northern Louisiana Synod and Northwest Synod of Wisconsin, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and inspire them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders and encourage one another to proclaim the gospel and serve our neighbors in need.

26 Thank God for the spiritual nourishment we receive when we gather around the table to celebrate communion, and for the Triune God, who calls and equips us to do God's work in the world.

27 Like the apostle Thomas, we all experience moments of doubt and disbelief. Pray that God will be patient and forgiving with us, rekindling our trust in a Spirit that helps us when our faith weakens.

28 Thank God for volunteers who respond to the needs of the church and society by sharing their time, gifts and passion. Pray that we will extend to people of all ages the invitation to serve God.

29 Pray for those who suffer the trauma of gun violence in their communities and elsewhere. Ask for wisdom in responding to our stricken neighbors, for guidance in working to ending gun violence and for fearless respect for human life — a precious gift from God, our creator.

30 Again, we rejoice and shout, "Hallelujah! The Lord, our savior, is risen!" The good news and power of Easter that we experience cannot be confined to a single calendar day
