Dear Siblings in Christ,

"...the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things...If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit." (Galatians 5:22-23, 25)

Why are you here? Most likely you're reading this at your congregations annual meeting. And perhaps you are pondering this same question: "why am I here when I could be doing something else that's more exciting than a boring church business meeting?"

But what if congregation annual meetings were seen as more than just a "business meeting?" What if we thought of our Annual Meetings as the exciting continuation of our year-long discernment about where God is calling our congregation to go AND, even more exciting, as taking the first and biggest step of the new year into the calling from God that we discerned together?!

Annual Meetings are the time, usually the only time of the year, when the majority of your congregation gathers to make important decisions about leadership for the congregation (president, council members), finances (the budget, compensation packages), and how the congregation hopes and plans to do its ministry over the next year and beyond.

These necessary decisions are hopefully ignited from the values and principles sparked by the Holy Spirit through spiritual discernment. They emerge from hearts and spirits made bold by the transforming love of Christ and empowered through by the Spirit's fruit in "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." They come from a mutually discovered purpose (why are we doing this?) and vision (where is God calling us to go?) in conversation with one another and with God.

What if we entered into our Annual Meetings with the perspective of opportunity and the mindset of generosity rather than just one more church-thing to do on a Sunday afternoon in January that's keeping us from watching the NFL playoffs? Imagine what God could accomplish in and through us for the sake of Christ's congregation, Christ's Church, and the wider world!

Congregations are not the only part of the church that have annual meetings. The Montana Synod, composed of congregations from across Montana and Northern Wyoming will also be having its Annual Meeting (also known as the Synod Assembly) in Great Falls, MT on May 30-31, 2025. As a Synod, we will walk on Christ's way together to elect the synod's leadership including a bishop, manage with generosity the blessings God has given to this Synod, and equip each other for listening to the Spirit's guidance, proclaiming Christ's Gospel, doing Christ's love, and collaborating for Christ's ministry. The theme for the 2025 Montana Synod Assembly is "Equipping for Hope."

There is a third Annual Meeting that will be happening this year – the ELCA's triannual Churchwide Assembly will meet in Phoenix, AZ on July 28-August 2, 2025. As the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, voting members will gather from diverse places across this country to discern the direction of the Holy Spirit in electing a new presiding bishop and new Churchwide

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secretary, managing the blessings the ELCA has been given, deciding how we will live as Christ's Church together, and how God is calling us as the ELCA to move toward God's future together. In all of these opportunities to gather for "Annual Meetings" in the name of Jesus Christ, let us remember that we are each and all parts of Jesus' Church, the body of Christ, and let us be emboldened to live out our faith through the hope, love and joy poured into us by the Holy Spirit. May your congregation be blessed in this New Year by the new life that comes to us only in Jesus Christ!

People of Peace,

What does it mean to have success in ministry?

Over the years, congregations have answered this question through the lens of "bucks and butts," as long as there are dollars in the offering plates and people in the pews, things are good. This *can* be an ok way to measure success. It *can* mean that a congregation is doing good work that people want to be a part of, that people want to put their money and their time toward the work of the community.

If we <u>do</u> measure success in this way, Peace Lutheran had a very successful year. Our numbers of people attending worship have been relatively steady in this postpandemic landscape. As you will see in the budget reports, we ended 2024 with a budget surplus of over \$56,000. We were able to give to partner ministries and our own outreach ministries in amounts larger than previous years. If we measure success by "bucks and butts," 2024 was a successful year!

However, I think we can agree that these metrics alone do not measure the success of a ministry. There are plenty of small congregations who are struggling to make ends meet that are doing vital ministry in their communities. There are many large congregations with enormous budgets that are on spiritual life support. I think it can be said that Peace was successful in regards to money and attendance in 2024. Even more importantly, Peace was successful in less tangible ways; ways that I would like to highlight in the rest of this letter.

Starting with the internal ministries of Peace, we saw success in a number of ways. Peace Lutheran celebrated 75 years of ministry- a testament to the lasting power of this congregation and a history of perseverance in faith. We weathered seasons of staffing upheaval, where volunteers stepped up to continue the tasks necessary to

keep the church functioning until we could fill open positions. We had the first First Communion class since before 2020. We sent nine of our youth to Christikon at no cost to their families. We sent out birthday cards to the members for whom we had birthdays on file. We experienced the connection of relationships in smallgroup ministries, such as WELCA circles, Men's Breakfast, Parents of Peace, and Thursday Morning Bible Study, just to name a few. I'm sure there are other examples that you can think of that I have not included here. The vibrancy of Peace continues to shine in the Billings community!

Turning to outward-facing ministries, success is again not hard to come by. Our Food Pantry was bustling throughout the year. We hosted multiple weeks of Family Promise guests, providing safety and stability for our neighbor families in need. We gave financially to various ministries, including disaster relief, homelessness relief, child/youth/family programs near and far, and refugee resettlement. We hosted Nations to Neighbors in our office space and in our classroom areas to help them in their mission of supporting new arrivals to the United States and to Billings. Again, this is not an exhaustive list. We are involved in supporting so much good work that it is impossible to summarize the entirety of all Peace does in this letter.

As you read through this Report, I encourage you to consider what success looks like in the ministry areas highlighted throughout. I believe that you will see repeated in these pages examples of successful ministry, filled with the love of God and led by our experience of Christ.

Ultimately, that is what success in ministry means to me- sharing God's love with the world in the ways that we can, with the resources God has given us. Put another way, we might consider ministry success in this way: "Making Christ available to all, but Rejoicing, Renewing, and Reaching out."

Thank you for a successful ministry year in 2024, and may God continue to bless Peace Lutheran, so that we may bless others in 2025 and beyond.

Peace Lutheran Church Annual Meeting January 24, 2024

The 2024 Annual Meeting was called to order at 11:20 AM by Council President Jeff Murray. Pastor Seth opened with prayer. A motion to approve the agenda was made by Linda Strosky, with a second by Mary Mosdal. Motion passed. Next, was the approval of the 2022 Annual Meeting minutes. A motion was made by Rhonda Sappington to approve the minutes, with Bob Peterson seconding. Motion passed. We then went to the Treasurer's Report. Steve Frank started on pages 28 and 29 of the meeting booklet. Projected unrestricted offerings for 2023 were \$324,884.00, and the actual unrestricted offerings were \$265,655.63. He then went over a few line items that were over budget and explained why they were. New checks were to be ordered, which was an extra cost, as well charges for using Vanco; the direct deposit system. At the end of 2023 the budget came in at \$332,698.15, which left a deficit of -66,049.50. Dewey Anderson asked what the proposed percentage of increase in salaries would be. Steve explained that would be talked about later in the meeting. A motion was made by George Simek to accept the 2023 budget, with Paul Strosky seconding. Motion passed.

The next item of business was Elections. George Simek asked how many Council members we can have. That number is 12. Ann Barsness presented the ballot for Council members. Nominations for Council members from the floor were asked for. Sylvia Peterson made a motion to close nominations from the floor, with Holli Miller seconding. Motion passed. Bonnie Hovik Clausen made a motion to accept the slate for Council, with George Simek seconding. Motion passed. Bernie Mason made a motion to accept the slate for Boards and Committees, with Deb Sider seconding. Motion passed. Synod Assembly representative nominations were next. Julie Draeger nominated herself and Dave Draeger as the Synod Assembly representatives. George Simek made a motion to cease nominations and select Dave and Julie Draeger as representatives. Louis Taylor seconded, and the motion passed. Lastly for nominations were for the Nominations from the congregation include Deb Sider, Bob Peterson, and Peggy Welliever. Tony Pecarina made a motion to close nominations, with Melissa Sider seconding. Motion passed.

Staff reports began with Pastor Seth highlighting a few items from the year. He thanked the congregation for calling him and their continued support, and that he was looking forward to the next year. He also talked about the Council Retreat held in May of 2023. Pastor Seth thanked Vanessa for building the Wednesday night program back from the ground up. Lastly he talked about the Office Manager vacancy. The personnel committee will meet to go over a plan. Vanessa also gave a report on Youth activities. In June of 2023 a shift was made in the program, splitting the kids into K-3 groups and 4-8 groups. She asked for volunteers to help.

There was no Old Business, so we moved to New Business. Pastor Seth put together a proposal for a Building Reserve Fund. The proposal suggested that we redesignate the House of Peace Fund to the Building Reserve Fund. Also, moving the Building Fund into the new Building Reserve Fund. Kristi Bummer asked if a written policy would be prepared that describes the use of the fund. Pastor Seth suggested that Peace should have a written policy. George Simek asked if someone donates to the Building and Reserve fund if 10% would be taken out and put in the general fund? Pastor Seth said it would be treated as a Designated Fund, which 10% is taken if the donation is over \$10,000. There was concern about putting \$500 into the fund each month. After much discussion, Tony Pecarina made a motion to move ahead with the document, allowing discussion and amending the Building Reserve Fund Proposal, with Bob Bakko seconding. Tony Pecarina made a motion to adjust the monthly giving to state a budgeted amount that is agreed up at the annual meeting. The new resolution will state "be it further resolved that Peace Lutheran Church transfer an amount from the approved annual budget per month in perpetuity from its General Fund to its newly designated Building Reserve Fund". Julie seconded the motion. There was further discussion, Pastor Seth read the amended resolution. The resolution reads "And be it further resolved that Peace Lutheran Church transfer an amount approved by the annual budget in perpetuity from its General Fund to its new designated Building Reserve Fund". Pastor Seth inquired if anyone would call the question, and it

was called by Linda Strosky. A vote was needed to end discussion and vote on the amendment. One opposed, and the motion passed. Next, Jeff asked for a vote on the amendment. Motion passed, none opposed. Tony then added another amendment to the proposal. The new amendment was to add an additional paragraph stating "Be it further resolved that any expense needing to be paid from this account in the sum of \$10,000 or more must be approved by the congregation in a special meeting or an Annual Meeting". George Simek seconded. Motion passed. Paul Strosky called the question. George Simek made a motion to accept the proposal as amended by the congregation. Lisa Donovan seconded. Motion passed, with one opposing. Moving to the Budget proposal. Steve Frank stated that committees bring their budgets to the Council. Some items pointed out included a 6.25% increase in wages. This is the recommendation from the Synod. Benevolence went from 6% for the Synod and 5% for quarterly gifts to 4% and 4% for each. There were a few new line items added to various budget categories. Kristi Bummer brought forth concern about the reduction in the percentage of benevolence. She strongly encouraged that our benevolence stay the same or be increased. A question was asked if it was practical to assume the giving was going to increase 25% to meet the budget? Jeff felt that the budget was workable, and that people would give more. Kim Wilker spoke about the Pastor's Compensation. He said that the Montana Synod's compensation numbers are lower than other synods. He believes that the increase was overdue. Encouraged support for Pastor's compensation. As discussion continued about the budget, George Simek made a motion to cut the Building Reserve Fund to \$250 a month. Ione Bloom seconded, and the motion passed. Julie Draeger made a motion to lower the 75th Anniversary budget from \$3000 to \$1500. Bernie Mason seconded the motion, and the motion passed. Dean Jensen made a motion to raise the guarterly gift to 6%. Kristi Bummer seconded. Motion passed, with 4 opposed. Lastly, a motion was made by Molly Johnson to approve the amended budget, with Holli Miller seconding. Motion passed, with 2 opposed. The meeting was closed with a hymn and a closing prayer. A motion to adjourn was made by Tony Pecarina, with Lisa Donovan seconding. The meeting was adjourned at 1:04 PM

At the Annual Meeting on January 28, 2024, the congregation adopted the resolution that follows:

BE IT RESOLVED that Peace Lutheran Church, at its annual meeting on January 28, 2024, redesignate the House of Peace Fund as its Building Reserve Fund;

And BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Peace Lutheran Church, at its annual meeting on January 28, 2024, absorb the already existing Building Fund into this newly redesignated Building Reserve Fund;

And BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Peace Lutheran Church transfer in perpetuity an amount from approved annual budget from its General Fund to this newly redesignated Building Reserve Fund;

And BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Peace Lutheran Church allow members and givers to designate offerings toward the newly redesignated Building Reserve Fund, if they desire to do so;

And BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this newly redesignated Building Reserve Fund be used exclusively for planned property maintenance, emergency property costs, and for housing down payment assistance to Pastors under call when invoices received for these expenses would create undue burden on the General Fund Budget.

And BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any expense above \$10,000 needs to be approved at a special or annual Congregational meeting.

• 75th Anniversary Celebration:

We celebrated our 75th anniversary with a worship service and meal, honoring our church's history and the faithful work of those before us.

Community Building:

Fellowship remained central to our church life through potlucks, "Refuel" meals, Easter brunch, and outdoor events, deepening connections within our congregation.

Food Pantry Ministry:

Our food pantry continued to support those in need, thanks to the generosity of our congregation.

Nations to Neighbors Program:

This year, we supported the resettlement of refugees who have entered the country legally, embodying our mission to care for strangers among us.

• SAIL Program (Staying Active and Independent for Life): We introduced the SAIL program to help seniors stay active and independent, fostering connection within the church.

Family Promise:

We partnered with other local churches to support Family Promise, providing shelter and meals to homeless families.

• **Outreach and Community Support**: We assisted with the St. John's United outdoor concert, distributed 16 Thanksgiving food baskets, and gathered gifts for families in need during Christmas.

We welcomed Bishop Laurie for a visit, which included a pie social and discussion about the Montana Synod's challenges and opportunities. As we look to 2025, we are excited for what God will do through our church. We remain committed to serving others and are grateful for each of you who make Peace Lutheran a caring community.

It is nearly impossible to remember everything that happens in a year of ministry. In acknowledgement of this fact, the way I create this Annual Report is by going back through the reports that I shared with the Congregational Council through the months of the previous year. I figure, if it was important to mention then, it is probably important to mention in my yearly review.

What a gift this practice has become! Because I can't remember everything we have done together as a congregation, the reminders provided by the previous twelve months' reports are a huge blessing. It's like opening up a treasure chest full of meaningful items and going back through them to revisit the associated memories. I hope these reminders are as much a gift to you as they have been to me.

Here are a few of those memories I would like to share:

Peace 75th Anniversary Celebration

October 3, 2024 marked the anniversary of Peace's incorporation seventy-five years prior. We had a wonderful anniversary service the following Sunday in which we welcomed Pastor Kay Wittman, Director of Evangelical Mission for the Montana Synod of the ELCA, who helped us mark the occasion. Pastor Kay and I shared a dialogue-style sermon, in which we discussed the history of Peace, moments in the larger culture, and God's grace through it all. Lunch was catered, Ann Barsness and Eddy Popp shared memories of their experiences at Peace, and we displayed mementos from the past. As we looked back, we also dreamed of the future, a future in which Peace continues to follow God's call in the lives of its members. Here's to another 75 and more!

Youth Communion Classes

Peace held First Communion classes in preparation for a First Communion service on Maundy Thursday 2024. Kids and their parents joined for fellowship, education, and fun over a number of weeks in the spring. We communed six children for the first time during Holy Week, and celebrated this momentous occasion in the lives of our children.

Bishop Visit

Bishop Laurie Jungling of the Montana Synod visited Peace in April 2024. This was the first visit from a bishop in recent memory, and Peace was delighted to host her. Bishop Laurie gave a memorable sermon about being a sheep, and conducted an adult forum in which she shared about ministry happenings at the Synod level. The congregational Life committee hosted a Pie Social, and we all had chances to ask questions and hold discussion around the bishop's address.

Youth Ministry Transition

In April, we celebrated a decade of youth ministry led by our beloved Vanessa Steiger. In July, we bid her well wishes as she moved into different ministry focuses with American Lutheran Church. During the interim, the Education/Youth Committee (now Education/Youth & Family Committee) saw changes in membership, stepped up to continue providing excellent ministry to our youth, and supported me in our search for a new Director of Youth & Family Ministry. We excitedly closed the year announcing that our new staffperson, Natalie Olson, would begin the first Monday of January 2025. Through all this, God sustained this important ministry and reminded us that not only are the youth the future of the church, they are the present as well. As Jesus said, "Let the children come to me, and do not stop them, for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs." (Matthew 19:14)

Change of Administrative Assistant

The main office at Peace saw challenges in 2023 and early 2024. Dean Jenson retired in early 2023. Sue Vigesaa served a short tenure through the end of 2023. The first quarter of 2024 saw Vanessa, volunteers, and I filling gaps the best we could as we searched for a new Administrative Assistant. Eventually, we hired Kim Braaton, who began April 2, 2024. Kim has blessed Peace with her work for eight months now, and has shared her joy and appreciation for the people of Peace.

New Member Classes and Welcome

On Pentecost weekend, we welcomed eight new members to the congregation. In preparation for doing so, we provided a short, two-week course discussing Lutheran Theology, history, and Peace Lutheran's history and ministries. These new members have already contributed to the life of Peace in a number of ways, including volunteering, leading committees, and sharing generous financial offerings. We will welcome new members again in January 2025, and hope to continue building the community at Peace through all our members, guests, visitors, and volunteers.

Nations to Neighbors

Through the fall months of 2024, Peace hosted Nations to Neighbors (N2N), providing office space and areas for conducting an after-school program. This partnership had its challenges to work out, but also served to bless both parties as we envisioned what cross-cultural understanding and care can look like. Unfortunately, due to funding and time/space constraints, Peace and N2N will not continue this same partnership in 2025, but we do hope to continue to support their ministry financially and with volunteers and resources as we are able.

Stewardship Series

In October and November, the Abundant Life Committee helped me conduct a five-week Stewardship Series, in which we discussed the "ImPossible Promise of Enough." With this series, we shared how God kept God's promises to the Israelites throughout the Hebrew Bible, how God shared God's blessings through the ministry of Jesus Christ, and how we continue to live in the promises God has shared with all God's people. We saw an excellent response in our Estimate of Giving Cards and feel we are on good financial footing to end 2024 and spring into 2025. We will continue revisiting the theme of stewardship throughout the year, as we remind each other God's extraordinary promises continue to come true in our lives!

Last winter we experimented with "Super Sundays." It turned out not to be quite what we hoped, but we had a very fun intergenerational Valentine party and visit from Zoo Montana while we tried it out! Proceeds from the Fat Tuesday pancake feed and BINGO night supported the Parents of Peace Group. On St. Patrick's Day we held another wonderful Youth Fundraiser dinner. Thanks to master chef Bob Gilbertson for cooking the corned beef & cabbage, as well as everyone who donated a fabulous dessert for the auction. Thanks to your generosity, we raised enough money to send NINE kids to Christikon this summer. As they shared during Youth Worship this fall, it was an amazing experience for each camper from Peace. (And we learned the church van can handle the Boulder Road well!)

This summer brought another successful week of Vacation Bible School, where 24 volunteers served 87 participants. After our first ever "Peace at the Pool" trip to the Oasis, we bid farewell and Godspeed on new adventures to Vanessa. We are thankful for her 10+ years of ministry at Peace! We also experienced some turnover in committee members. It has been exciting to welcome new voices and dream about the future together. Much of the work that the committee has been doing in the last half of 2024 is covering volunteer needs for Wednesday Nights, re-visioning the roles of the committee and a new Youth Minister, and planning for a new Sunday School program. Thanks to everyone who completed the survey this fall to help our discernment.

We are very proud of all the youth who were involved in leading the camp-themed worship this fall, and the Christmas Program in December. From sharing a message, leading songs, collecting offering, or helping usher, we love seeing kids participate in worship! Children's messages the last couple of months of the year focused on different parts of worship and why we do what we do.

Older youth also had the opportunity to visit other ELCA congregations in Billings as they participated in the monthly Lutheran youth collective and joined King of Glory youth on "Mystery Bus" service project outings.

On Wednesday nights, the Peace Pals (Kindergarten - 4th grade) follow the lectionary Bible stories each week, with lots of games and crafts along the way. The Peace Youth (4th grade and up) began a new "Echo the Story" curriculum, which involves reflective listening, journaling, and drawing as they make their way through the Biblical story. MISSION AND SERVICE COMMITTEE

As part of the Reaching Out portion of Peace's Mission Statement, the Mission and Service Committee identifies and provides opportunities for Peace members to serve others, doing God's Work with Our Hands. The Bible says "And do not forget to do good and to share with others for with such sacrifices God is pleased" (Hebrews 13:16). The congregation of Peace Lutheran Church did a wonderful job of serving our brothers and sisters in Christ. 2024 Reaching Out included:

Food Pantry: supplied and distributed 33,148 pounds of food with 1,398

volunteer hours. The Pantry saw 2,157 visitors and served a total of 6,592 in need.

All Congregational Days of Service: Peace members, volunteering 30 hours of service, made 380 sandwiches for Salvation Army.

Family Promise: We continue to house homeless families though the Family Promise program. When families are at the church, Peace members volunteer to bring meals, spend the night, set up beds, tear down beds, and do laundry. We partner with First English and Bethlehem Lutheran in this ministry. It takes a village to support these families. Family Promise has a high rate of success. Ann Barsness has been the coordinator for this program for many years. She retired in September. Thanks to Ann for all her years of service. Debbie Smith and Jan Bakko are the new coordinators for Family Promise at Peace.

Promoted monetary donations locally, nationally, and globally through Souper Bowl of Caring (\$248.85), Lenten offerings, Buck a Chick (\$555.22), and shipment of quilts.

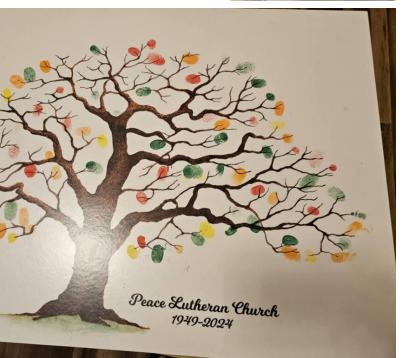

LEGACY BUILDING EVOLUTION _

In 2019, a three-phase sequence of demolition and construction commenced on the St. John's United Legacy building that first opened as a home for residents in 1963. The original three residential areas, named Wings, were repurposed to become a Transitional Rehab Center, affordable housing for older adults, and a new location for Center for Generations, business offices, Foundation offices, the CEO office, and a board room. Wing Four is currently under construction to become moderate-income rate housing for older adults and an outpatient therapy clinic. Wings Five, Six, and Seven were demolished and removed at year-end to clear the land for future construction of the Aeries housing community and Centrum public spaces.

RESPITE CARE SUITES ____

St. Johns United recently acquired a twelve-room hospice cottage on its property that had been owned and operated by Riverstone Health. A decision was made to utilize the cottage as a respite care site to be operated by SJU's At Home staff. Respite care provides short-term relief for primary caregivers of older adults, allowing caregivers time to rest, travel, manage personal tasks, or spend time with other family and friends. Primary caregivers will be able to place their loved ones into the welcoming, supervised, and safe context of SJU's respite care suites for a minimum of three hours to a maximum of all-day. Private rooms with comfort amenities and public spaces for social activities and meals will be available to guests. Personalized care services will also be offered for additional fees.

AERIES ____

Design work on the Aeries residential community for adults fifty-five years of age plus is completed. Architectural construction documents, pursuit of financing, legal contract development, and the process of securing entrance fee deposits are all advancing. Priority membership deposits of \$1,000 continue to be received to reserve placement or exercise right of refusal during the development phase of the project. Residents within Aeries will enjoy panoramic views, maintenance-free living, convenient amenities, and access to St. John's United healthcare services. For more information call (406) 655-5203.

OUTPATIENT THERAPY CLINIC

A portion of the Legacy building's Wing Four was reconstructed at year-end to be a modern outpatient therapy clinic to help people recover from surgery, illness, accident, or other health issues. Services offered within the clinic include physical therapy, occupational therapy, aquatic therapy, and speech therapy. Personalized treatment programs are designed to meet the needs of each patient.

ST. JOHN'S UNITED FAMILY SERVICES _

Sustained in part by donations from individuals and congregations, SJU Family Services connects with children, families, and individuals through compassionate programs. The C.A.R.E.S. program, funded by a grant from Lutheran Services in America, empowers families to utilize their natural and community resource supports to reduce referrals to the foster care system. In 2024, the C.A.R.E.S. team worked actively with 95 families who reported improved family relationships. Since 2022, C.A.R.E.S. has received referrals for 268 households. In 2024, Family Services licensed clinical social workers met in-person or via telehealth for over 300 counseling sessions with individuals. Education and counseling services were provided without fee to 41 expectant parents and their support people. One infant was placed into an adoptive home. Contract adoption services were provided to 20 families, and assistance was offered to 29 post-adoption cases, including two reunions. The Wendy's Wonderful Kids Adoption Recruiter, funded by a grant from the Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption, helped 20 Montana youth in foster care build connections and pursue permanent placements. Four permanent home placements were completed.

WYNDSTONE PATIO HOMES

Plans to construct four four-plex patio homes and a potential twelve-plex patio home at WyndStone in Billings Heights are advancing. Civil engineering is completed, and zoning approval has been granted. Construction bids are being received.

MODERATE INCOME RATE HOUSING

Efforts are advancing to transform former long-term care rooms within Wing Four of the Legacy building to become enlarged moderate-income rate residential apartments. The construction of two model apartments has been completed for potential residents to view and consider as future housing while the project evolves.

IN TIMES OF CRISIS: TÜRKIYE 9

SITUATION: In February 2023, massive earthquakes destroyed 90% of the buildings in the city of Antakya. More than 50,000 people died, and nearly 2 million became homeless in what survivors called an "apocalyptic" disaster.

IMPACT: Your congregation's generosity meant emergency supplies reached the epicenter in record time. Since the quakes, you have provided hot meals, clean water, LWR Quilts & Kits, temporary shelter and even longer-term container homes to help families get back on their feet.

For a tragedy of this magnitude, the scars of emotional trauma run deep. In a matter of minutes, our neighbors lost their homes, jobs and loved ones. Schools were destroyed. and playgrounds were filled with rubble and broken glass. As families work to rebuild their lives, you are helping them heal.

Seventeen-year-old Dilan Cabiroğcu's family was grateful to move into their new container home, built with your support, after losing everything. But she soon grew bored and listless. She watched her father fall into depression. Dilan still attends school online, because hers is too damaged to open in person.

Everything changed when she started hanging out at a youthfriendly community center that - through your generosity - offers games, sports, activities, classes and counseling for teens. The goal is to help youth process the disaster and find hope for the future. Today, Dilan has a new outlook. She's attending counseling to address her trauma and, inspired by the opportunities you've provided, is dreaming of being a nurse.

"Here, I learn new things and meet new people, my head is cleared, and I become more energetic," she said. "If it wasn't for this place, I would probably still be experiencing the shock of the earthquake."

QUILTS & KITS: UNITED STATES 9

SITUATION: In September, Lutheran World Relief announced that the Quilt & Kit Ministry was expanding to reach our neighbors in the U.S. Unexpectedly, hurricanes Helene and Milton ravaged communities in North Carolina, Florida and beyond just days later.

IMPACT: Thanks to the guilters and kit makers who faithfully fill our shelves, LWR began packing trucks before the storms reached land. An initial shipment of 10 truckloads of Quilts & Kits were distributed in hard-hit communities in North Carolina, Florida, Mississippi and Louisiana. Immediately after the storms, your generosity also made it possible to rush bottled water and other essentials to western North Carolina and Florida. Then we provided cash grants to our local partners to distribute food, water and other urgently needed supplies to provide comfort and dignity to families in their time of need.

Edward was excited to pick out his LWR quilt. "I'd just like to say thank you to the people that put their time and love and patience in making these beautiful blankets for everybody," he said. "It is going to remind me where I've been and where I'm going. I can say I got this when I lost everything, and this is one of the first, nicest things I got. And it gave me something to hold on to in the midst of a crisis."

FOR THE LONG TERM: SOUTH SUDAN 9

SITUATION: Violence, grinding poverty and four years of extreme flooding have uprooted over 4 million people. While this is an urgent crisis, you are helping families learn skills to thrive in difficult circumstances.

IMPACT: Your compassion has traveled to the hardest-toreach displacement camps, where exhausted families arrive starving, traumatized and empty-handed after walking for days.

When they arrive, your love greets them with a medical screening to check for malnutrition. Parents with malnourished children receive nutrition counseling and support, along with seeds and training on how to grow a variety of nourishing foods in their home gardens.

Congregations like yours have also made it possible for 10,000 people - primarily widows and single mothers - to receive livelihoods training in fishing, raising poultry or vegetable farming. They also learn the basic business and financial skills needed to launch small businesses to sell their products. Thanks to your enduring compassion, food security has increased by 50% among camp residents. Malnutrition has significantly decreased, and thousands of people have lifelong skills and stable ways to feed and support their families.

Through your generosity, God is at work across the ELCA. A portion of your offering, called Mission Support, advances the ministry of our church, helping the ELCA nurture Christian community, raise up leaders, serve our neighbors and strive for justice.
